Welcome to the first edition of Healthy Communities Statewide News. I hope that you will continue to find this newsletter useful and informative and be kept up to date with what is happening at Healthy Communities. In a few weeks you'll be sent a membership survey to get your feedback on the newsletter and suggestions for improvements.

2012 promises to be a big year. The state election may bring a change of government and possible changes to responses to both HIV and LGBT issues. Healthy Communities has been talking with Labor, the LNP and Greens about the issues we see as important to the LGBT community, and the actions we'd like them to commit to and deliver once in government.

This year will also see significant changes to Queensland Health. We are already seeing the emergence of Medicare Locals to coordinate primary care at a local level, and soon we'll see

Local Health & Hospital Networks focusing on hospital care. Labor plans to split Queensland Health into two new organisations, one focused on managing the whole health system and the other providing improved corporate services.

It will be important to ensure that the needs of LGBT people and communities as well as those living with HIV are not lost in the restructures. We already have some concerns about the low priority given to prevention and health promotion in the proposals for splitting Queensland Health. Through the Community Health Services Network (facilitated by QCOSS) we have made our views known.

Against all this, the day-to-day work of Healthy Communities will continue. The sexual health program is focusing its efforts on sexual networks where HIV transmission is most likely to happen, enhancing our use of social media and supporting men to better implement risk reduction strategies. The '2 Spirits' program is working on implementing the recommendations from its external review, including a renewed focus on HIV & viral hepatitis prevention and sexual health promotion among gay men & sisters, as well as attempting to expand the project to address other health and community issues for LGBT people who are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander.

The LGBT Health Program continues to deliver LGBT awareness training and alcohol, tobacco and other drugs health promotion initiatives. This year we'll also see new projects, including counselling services for LGBT people affected by the 2011 natural disasters and/or have mental health concerns and support to LGBT seniors. Our unfunded action groups (e.g. lesbian, trans*, multicultural, history, ageing) will also continue volunteer led projects and attempting to secure additional resources. All of these services and activities are of course supported by our Admin Team.

You can have your chance to influence what we do at Healthy Communities over the coming years by commenting on our draft Strategic Plan.

Thanks for all your support in 2011 and we looking forward to working with you in 2012.

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LGBT Health News

Political Action 2012 – President, Mark Morein

Last year saw a lot of political activity by members of the LGBT Communities. The decision by the ALP to support Marriage Equality was a great success for us; the decision to make this a conscience vote less so.

AT HC we are proud that we were able to work hard in the lobbying for these changes, but there were many people involved – among them the teams at Australian Marriage Equality, Equal Love, Rainbow Labor, and all the other organisations and individuals who wrote to their MP's, lobbied them in person, and went to Sydney to show their support for these changes. All deserve a giant thank you from our communities.

The work continues, but this year it's more about careful targeting of MP's, in particular to get a conscience vote from the Coalition, to ensure that the Bill is passed when it reaches Parliament.

While the legalisation of Same Sex Marriage receives a lot of publicity in both LGBT and mainstream media, there are other issues on the political horizon that we need to work on as well. With the upcoming state and council elections, this is the time to make sure that these important issues remain front and centre. At Healthy Communities we will continue lobbying at all levels to end any and all ways that LGBT people are treated as second class citizens.

Queensland is the only state that has unequal Age of Consent Laws. While 16 is the Age of Consent for most sexual activity, for anal intercourse (“sodomy”) the minimum age is 18. This impacts most heavily on young gay and bi men because the criminalisation of their sexual activity leads to all sorts of negative health outcomes. Please sign the e-petition at

To be honest, there’s not a whole lot we can do to force reform action. Premier Bligh has refused to act on Labor's existing Policy Platform commitment, and the LNP has declared that it would never support this reform. However this is not a reason for sitting back and doing nothing; it is in fact the time to lay the groundwork so that when the politics allow it, we are ready to make this happen. This is the strategy that has been successfully used to advocate for same sex marriage. You can help by emailing Premier Anna Bligh ThePremier@premiers.qld.gov.au emphasising that it is not acceptable for some Queensland youth to be treated differently to others - because all youth deserve equality. In the debate about Civil Partnerships she spoke about the value of equality and a fair go for all Queenslanders, and she should be reminded that the current discriminatory law breaches the United Nations International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights Resource information is stored at this link: www.queerradio.org/AgeOfConsent.htm

These are not the only issues we face – the so-called “Gay Panic Defense”, the rights of certain (religious) employers to discriminate against people based on their sexuality, better funding and recognition for our community organisations are also important, and I will be writing about them in upcoming newsletters.

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Better Health Care for Transgender people

Why this is Important

Currently there is very little to zero funding or support for intersex transsexual, transgender, sister-girl, brother-boy & gender diverse Australians for healthcare.

And as a result there is a growing concern & fear in the community that gender centres & some sexual health services are at risk of shutting their doors to Australians in need of health services because of the lack of funding & support from the federal & state governments. Lives are lost every year because people cannot access to the services that they so sorely need. These types of health care services are not elective for the greatest majority of these people, they are essential to someone who experiences severe gender dysphoria or other social, health & well being issues.

It has been proven many times that Counselling & Therapy, along with Vocal Feminisation, Facial Feminisation & Sex Reassignment Surgery can all help to save lives!!!

Being intersex, transsexual, transgender or gender diverse is not a choice for gender diverse Australians!

Many people now believe that gender identity is predetermined before birth through the action of sex hormones during natal development. And growing up as gender diverse person is very difficult because everyone is expected to conform to the binary gender identity model and if you don't then you are often singled out, bullied & abused. Even if you repress gender issues, then there are many other social & mental health problems that arise. No one chooses or subscribes to a life of rejection, discrimination, vilification, bullying & abuse - this is something that chooses you!

This is a card we were dealt and are trying to now live with and our government needs to recognise this!

There are many Australians who suffer from secondary issues such as anxiety & depression & many other mental disorders that are related to being gender diverse & having gender dysphoria simply because of who they really are. As a result they experience an array of social & health problems brought about by day-to-day stress & anxiety of living with a gender identity that varies from their assigned biological birth sex.

This is a burden to the Australian taxpayer, mental health services & a whole array of other welfare & supporting organisations. Such as claims for Centreline payments because they lost their job, become homeless because they were kicked out by family and housemates, or were victims of violence, sexual assault or other domestic violence or abuse, or developed serious mental health issues and on disability support pension after trying to cope with all of the above.

The World Professional Association of Transgender Health (WPATH) released the new Standards of Care to better support the transsexual, transgender & gender diverse community. This document calls on governments, support groups and agencies to adopt new policies for better transgender health care. However the Ministers for Health right across Australia all appear to be slow to catch onto these new recommendations in Transgender Health Standards of Care.

Additionally a report called the "Sex files Report" was compiled by the Human Rights Commission in 2009, calling on all governments to remove discriminatory policy from all levels of administration. However there is many offices of the federal & state governments that have ignored this report & need to have policies reviewed. Many people in the community believe that all federal & state government health departments should set the example and lead the way.

Access to proper counselling, therapy, treatments & cosmetic surgery is essential to many gender diverse people to enable them live happy & fulfilling lives. These services are essential so gender diverse people can blend and be accepted into society and reduce the risk of discrimination, vilification, abuse & violence that they might face.

The intersex, transsexual, transgender & gender diverse community might be only a minority group in Australia, but enough is enough. It is time we spoke out with a unified voice about the ignorance & neglect by the federal & state ministers for health by overlooking the health care needs of Australians.

Australia's HIV prevention revolution

Bill Whittaker is one of the architects of Australia's response to AIDS and has worked in HIV policy and strategy for more than 25 years. Chris Clementson's edited version below reports Bill's views on changes in HIV prevention.

We have exciting scientific evidence which could dramatically reverse the pace of the HIV epidemic and prevent millions of new infections, sickness and deaths.

New HIV treatments are having a tremendous impact, but for every one person put on HIV treatment, another two people become infected.

Recently, the United Nations agreed to a bold new Declaration to fight AIDS. Centrepieces of the UN Declaration are new HIV prevention targets by 2015 including:

- reducing sexual transmission of HIV by 50%;
- reducing injecting drug use HIV transmissions by 50%;
- eliminating mother to child HIV transmissions.

So how could these be achieved?

- by dramatically scaling up prevention programs;
- by freeing up access to HIV testing;
- by increasing HIV education alongside wide availability of condoms and sterile injecting equipment;
- and by fully exploiting the potential of social media, mobile phones and the internet.

Now we can capitalise on the additional prevention benefits that HIV treatment can deliver. Just as HIV treatment was revolutionised 15 years ago by 'combination treatment' – the Declaration heralds an era of 'combination prevention'. Proven prevention programs and communication innovation are combined with wide availability of HIV treatment to help drive down rates of new HIV infections.

In Australia our rate of new HIV infections is around 1000 per year, mostly among gay men.

Unfortunately our current national HIV Strategy is fine on principles, but scant on actions and enhanced funding – and its implementation has been slow and a source of frustration.

This current 6th National HIV strategy and most state/territory strategies, also continue the drift away from setting ambitious, time-bound targets. Now is the opportunity for us to embrace combination prevention and to set bold prevention targets based on those in the 2011 Declaration.

So what should this revitalised Australian HIV prevention effort comprise?

Firstly, let's update people with HIV about the emerging evidence concerning the health benefits of starting treatment early, including above 500 CD4 counts, and the impact that treatment has on reducing HIV transmission.

Secondly, let's realise the greatest prevention benefit from treatment will be through HIV-positive people taking up early HIV treatment.

Thirdly, promote 'combination prevention' – consistent condom use and safe injecting, as well as increasing PLHIV uptake of HIV treatment.

Fourthly, end prescribing restrictions, so that doctors prescribe ARVs for PLHIV, with CD4 counts above 500, who wish to take up early treatment.

Fifthly, increase HIV testing campaigns and strategies like wider medico initiated HIV testing and rapid testing in community settings.

Finally, let's set bold prevention targets and timelines to generate momentum and assess progress against the 2011 UN Declaration's targets. For the Australian context these include:

- Reducing sexual transmission of HIV among gay men by 80% by 2015;
- Eliminating HIV transmission from injecting drug use by 2015;
- Eliminating HIV transmission among sex workers and clients by 2015;
- And by 2013, 90% of people with HIV in Australia are on HIV antiviral treatment.

One of the best things Australia can do to support a global HIV prevention revolution is to lead by example and champion what we are doing in testing, treatment and education.

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It doesn't pay to think too much about sex Gay sex is more than penetration. It takes headology!

A colleague of mine who was doing too much work was once challenged to let go of something and he responded by saying "I can't, everything is important!" So it is when we unpack many of the things we do in life; including sex.

Sex is much more than penetration, even the physical act can be broken down to other components like exertion, climax and orgasm. But it's what goes on in our heads that sometimes counts more in getting us off.

The psychology of sex is something books are written about, but for many LGBT people it can be about meeting social needs such as acceptance from another human being and validation, or erasing internalised homophobia and feelings of shame. It can be centred in your image and what your inner self is looking for in terms of protection or self actualisation. It is often complex, adding meaning and desire to the act itself and impacting on your life as a whole.

The orgasm is often seen as the desired outcome of sex, but the mind is what generates the pleasure. Both during the act itself ...and later on, after your partner(s) have left and you recall/fantasize over the encounter. In other words, sex that is "hot" in the doing, is hugely influenced by the mind and psychology behind its anticipation, action and reimagining.

For some of us reaching orgasm is not required, sex can be just as fulfilling as a psychological experience, but a goal for gay men and other sexually active members of our community should be to have sex lives that are "hot", pleasurable and full of meaning.

Unfortunately for many of us, sex stops at getting off on our own orgasm, or ensuring your partner gets theirs, and the focus on the physical can lead a lack of fulfilment and performance anxiety. Many of the people who access the counselling services available though Healthy Communities find that sex can impact on their presenting issues, so if you are experiencing difficulties in your life always take a moment to see if sex is impacting on it in some way and think about what you want from the sex you are having.

Booze Bit ME – Watch out for people slouched in LGBT Venues' Toilets

Images of people slouching against walls and kneeling before toilet bowls have appeared in LGBT venues in Queensland as part of a new campaign by Healthy Communities.

'Booze Bit Me' highlights the effects of excessive alcohol consumption and provides information, support and referrals to people wanting to reduce or better manage their drinking.

"Booze Bit Me is a website where people can take a short test to measure their alcohol intake, and share the results with friends", said Shane Garvey, Alcohol Tobacco & Other Drugs Co-ordinator.

"The website also contains information and support, a section on how to plan a party and being a good party host, and even tips on how to avoid a hangover."

The website (<http://www.boozebit.me>) is being promoted in LGBT bars and sex-on-premises-venues (SOPV's) through-out Queensland. Life size stickers of people in a state of intoxication have been installed in toilets with the website printed on their t-shirts.

"We received overwhelming support from the participating LGBT venues and without them the campaign would have not been possible", said Shane Garvey.

"Initial reaction from the general LGBT public has been positive, with some of the stickers being 'souvenired' by patrons."

The campaign is in response to growing evidence that LGBT people are drinking at higher levels than their heterosexual counterparts. The 2010 National Drug Strategy Household Survey report found that

- 28.6% of homosexual/bisexual people drank at risky levels over their lifetime compared to 20.3% of heterosexuals
- 24.5% of homosexual/bisexual people had drunk at risky levels on single occasions (at least weekly) compared to 15.9% of heterosexuals

Healthy Communities is funded by Queensland Health to deliver alcohol, tobacco and other drug health promotion services to LGBT people in Queensland.

Community Forums 2012

The 2 Spirits team will be continuing to roll out the Elders and Community Forums throughout 2012. Building on the success of Forums held in Mackay and Roma in 2011, the 2 Spirits team is currently planning community visits in Toowoomba, Dalby and Roma regions in the first half of the year. The Forums are an excellent opportunity for staff to meet with Elders in each region, and learn from their years of experience. Additionally, it is an opportunity to provide LGBT education to the many service providers in the region through a “whole of community approach”.

Deadly Sex Congress - March 2012

Deadly Sex Congress is a training and professional development congress for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people working in the sexual health sector in Queensland. 2spirits will be conducting a session on “Effective Health Promotion” within the upcoming congress, which will explore strategies for sexual health workers to provide the best service possible for LGBT Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

This year, the Deadly Sex Congress will turn ten, and will be held in the Gold Coast. An annual event – the Deadly Sex Congress is the primary gathering for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander sexual health workers across the state, and it a vital step in building networks allowing 2 Spirits to conduct community education. This year’s congress should support the project entering the communities throughout Toowoomba, Roma and Dalby, as well as communities further north in Bamaga and Thursday Island.

Community group support

Throughout 2011 and now 2012, the 2 Spirits team have been providing support to the

gar'ban'djee'lum network. The gar' ban' djee' lum group is a social group for LGBT Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living in the Brisbane region. The network is now rebranding itself – launching a new logo, facebook page and post cards to promote inclusion within the group.

The name gar' ban' djee' lum was given to the group by Elders from the Butchulla and Gubbi Gubbi people and means “Us Mob”.

Lubelicious / Condoman 2 Launch

Condoman is a character who has promoted sexual health and a removal of shame around sexuality for a number of years now. More recently Condoman was relaunched, with a more contemporary look to him. As part of this launch, a Condoman Comic book was released, which became exceptionally popular.

We are now on the brink of launching the Series 2 for Condoman , which will see the introduction of a number of new characters – most importantly Lubelicious and a range of characters representing Sexually Transmitted Infections. The other characters to be launched represent : Chlamydia, Gonorrhoea, Hep B, Herpes, HIV, HPV, Syphilis, as well as Stigmalien – representing stigma associated with STI's

Lubelicious represents a strong, confident, Indigenous woman who promotes not only the use of lube with Condoms, but also projects confidence as Condoman's assistant. Healthy Communities, in conjunction with QAIHC (Queensland Aboriginal and Islander Health Council) , and Queensland Health are producing Lubelicious suits to be worn at community events along with the current Condoman character.

The Condoman Comic Book 2 will be launched in May, along with the characters Lubelicious and the various STI characters – however for a sneak peak of Lubelicious, we have developed a facebook page for her.
